Synopsis of Book

This almost wordless picture book *Blue Sky White Stars*, written by Sarvinder Naberhaus and illustrated by Kadir Nelson, celebrates the United States' heritage as reflected in the colors of the American flag. Each stirring two-page spread of vibrant paintings depicts a period in American history and the diversity of its people. The poetic language full of homophones evokes the country's cherished ideals. Perfect for a patriotic holiday or celebration or a thoughtful discussion about the United States' history and government for older children.

Using a TeachersFirst Reading Trek to Explore This Book

To motivate and enrich student reading, teachers and students can reference this visual collection of web resources and images as they relate to a book.

Using the Reading Trek in Class

- 1. While reading the book to the class, display the Reading Treks map on an interactive whiteboard and discuss places the text, colors, and pictures represent.
- 2. Have students research more about the book using the Reading Trek as a webquest.
- Research the history and symbolism of the United States flag as depicted in the book. Find pictures in other print materials or digital media that represent the flag colors and symbols. Use <u>this resource guide</u> or <u>video</u> to get started.
- 4. In each layer, have students explore the different places, such as geography, history, and culture.
- Show <u>this video</u> of a kindergarten class reading the book. This video resides on YouTube. If YouTube is blocked at your school, see the tips below. Then have the class or small groups create a video or other media production of a book or poem. See these movie making app suggestions: <u>Biteable</u>, <u>wevideo</u>, or <u>Rawshorts</u>.

Additional Activities

- 1. Have students write a poem or draw a picture of the U.S. flag or other <u>familiar symbols</u>.
- 2. Have students create their own personal flag in a medium of their choice.

- 3. Discuss immigration by having children explore their family's history. Students can ask family members about the stories of their ancestors that came to the U.S. and then share them with the class.
- 4. Have the whole class create a classroom <u>Google My Map</u> or a bulletin board map of the origins of the students around the world and in the U.S.
